are 18.0 in. (457.2 mm) wide x
30.0 in. (762.0 mm) tall. Advertisements other than the one
shown here actually described the
lamp as a "Carbide lamp." This ad
refers the lamp to the mining
trade.



Pinnacle carbide cap lamp - One of our Australian correspondents, Stephen McCabe, has commented on an early inquiry about a Pinnacle carbide cap lamp. There are many styles, types and sizes of cast aluminum and cast brass carbide hand lamps manufactured by the Pinnacle Engineering Company in Australia and marked PINNACLE usually in cast, raised letters. It was assumed that the well-publicized Pinnacle brass and copper carbide cap lamp had the same origin . . . Australia. Not so, say the Australian collecting community; they are convinced that the cap lamps originated in South America. Our "lamp world" grows with each bit of rediscovered knowledge.





Wooden cap box - The wooden Hercules electirc blasting cap box shown below is available for sale or trade. It is 4.5 in.

Repro lamps - In 1993 Mons. Claude Berry released the film "Germinal," inspired by the book written by Emile Zola. For the film, hundreds of real mine lamps were needed. The Arras-Maxei Society reopened the assembly line for the Arras type A. M. flame safety lamp. The advertisement shown at the left indicates that these lamps are now available to the public. The price is 1390 francs; address: Arras-Maxie, 25 Boulevard Robert Schuman, 62000 Arras, France. Thank you to Vincent Lepias for this information. Eventually these lamps will enter the "old mine lamp" market, so keep your eyes open.

DUNLAP'S - Many collectors have one or more DUNLAP'S PITTSBURGH oil wick cap lamps in their collection. Only a few have the odd-shaped product boxes (below) from their lamp(s). There are at least three size-styles of DUNLAP'S PITTSBURGH oil wick cap lamps . . . a face miner's size 2-7/16 in. tall, a driver's size lamp 3.0 in. tall and a samesize driver's lamp with a 3-3/4 in. x 6.0 in. braced wind deflector shield for use on cars or in windy drifts. These lamps were advertized as solderless . . . they had a riveted hook design and a riveted cap hinge; the spout was held on by a press-process, doublefold joint. They were coated with spelter.





Milburn No. 22 area lamp-Check your Milburn No. 22 carbide area lamps. Some time ago Tony Moon sent this xerox print of a photo of the name plate on a No. 22 lamp. The patent numbers on the plate are 1116820 and 1116821. But, the actual issued patent numbers are 1,116,221 and 1,116,222. What numbers do you find on your Milburn lamps?

Little Giant - Your mini-editor still needs several water door covers for Little Giant-type cast aluminum hand lamps. Identification is shown at the left, No. 356 Water Cap and spring. But we can easily do without the spring which did not seem to last very long in the lamps. Probably had something to do with a ferrous metal wire in water in an acidic atmosphere. 
Carbide tins - Of all the carbide tins with different product names, the Justrite tins are probably the most numerous. The one to the left is very common and the same shape is found with many other product names on its side. Also common are the "square" tins (right). This particular one is different because the "E" is missing from the trade mark legend in the center circle.




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






Arras, Paris & Lille, Manufacturer: France "K-P" lamp = system Klein-Pujol








French ARRAS flame safety lamp. Acetylene carbide illumination design with a Marsauttype bonnet.


