Mine Bell Signs

Here is an attractive Bell sign from the state of South Dakota, the home of the famous Homestake Mining Co., oldest active running mine in the United States. 20 sign measures inches across by 34 inches long, and like most Stonehouse signs is dark blue with white lettering. Looking at the bottom of the sign you will notice the reference to a station tender. In the larger mines each working level had a man called a station tender. His job was to load and unload the ore and mining cars equipment into the shaft cages, secure them and signal the hoistman using the bell cord. He was the only person allowed to use the bell cord that rang the mine bell. It was also his job

to give the signals when hoisting the miners or any other equipment riding in the cages.

Most of the mines using station tenders had signs like the one on this page saying "HANDS OFF BELLCORD", or a sign saying "BELL SIGNALS FOR CAGE TENDERS ONLY".

This porcelain Stonehouse sign is blue and white and measures 9" wide by 6 1/2 " high.
